# Buckinghamshire Archaeological Society NEWSLETTER – Spring 2016

## Report of the Honorary Librarian and Honorary Archivist

This will be my last report since I am not standing for re-election. I am again particularly grateful to our library volunteers for all their help throughout the year. Dr Jeremy Howarth spent many months preparing for our Prints Exhibition at the County Museum, selecting prints and carrying out research. He wrote detailed notes for a handlist which accompanies the exhibition and gave a talk at the opening on 27th February 2016. Over 70 members and invited guests attended the opening event and it was particularly gratifying to welcome Julian Clare who was responsible for the conservation of the print collection some years ago, a project headed by Diana Gulland and financed by the William Delafield Charitable Trust. Diana spoke at the opening about that project and how the Society's book "Historic Views of Buckinghamshire" came to be published. Many of the prints featured in the book are now on display and we have discounted the price to £5 so we can sell the book as a catalogue. I would also like to record my appreciation and thanks particularly to Mel Czapski, and to Richard De Peyer, David Erskine and all the Museum Staff too numerous to mention here who made the exhibition and opening event possible. I think they have done us proud. Hopefully the exhibition will help publicise our wonderful collection and I urge everyone to visit before it closes on 2<sup>nd</sup> July.

Dr Garry Marshall has again been a tower of strength sorting out and cataloguing the Society's own archive and helping to declutter the Muniment Room. He has recently been working on a catalogue of the late Professor Bill Mead's diaries and I'm also grateful to Diana Gulland for reading the diaries and advising on the draft catalogue.

Roelie Reed continues the somewhat exhausting task of going through all our pamphlet boxes, sorting and listing their contents.

Finally, Sheryl Mardlin has proved an invaluable volunteer, checking our stock against the Modes catalogue and tidying the library shelves. Together we have done a stock-take of the Muniment Room, sorted the journals and put them in proper files. As you will see from the list below our library and archives continue to grow apace so, with limited space, continual and judicious weeding is necessary. Journals are increasingly going online. The Archaeological Journal up to 1963 is free to download on the Archaeological Data Service website; <a href="http://archaeologydataservice.ac.uk/archives/view/archjournal/">http://archaeologydataservice.ac.uk/archives/view/archjournal/</a> so we have thrown away our old and tatty pre-1964 volumes. Of course if you don't have online access you can always contact the library and we can print articles for you. Many of our surplus offprints will also have to be discarded.

With Mike Palmer's help I monitor conditions in the Muniment Room. Tidying has helped and our new de-humidifer has restored humidity to recommended levels, but with journals double-banked conditions are still not ideal. We hold a significant stock of duplicate and non-Bucks related books in the Muniment Room, presumably given to the Society over many years. Some may be of value and space could be freed up by a selective disposal but that will be a question for my successor and Council.

Much of my time has again been spent running the Society's "office", dealing with book sales, distributing *Records*, giving copyright consents and publicising the Society's and other relevant events through e-mail and Twitter. Numbers coming to consult our collection in person have continued to dwindle. Enquiries come mainly via email and telephone and sometimes through the Museum. I'm grateful to Mike Farley and Brett Thorn for their help with archaeological questions. It's surprising how often we get enquiries about objects found in gardens or whilst walking the dog! We continue to receive enquiries about family, local and social history often from people who seem to be unaware of the existence of the Historic Environment Record, or more surprisingly the Centre for Buckinghamshire Studies. If we don't have the answer I direct them to the appropriate place and, together with publicising order local society's events, I like to think this helps promotes BAS's role as a co-ordinating organisation.
