THE SOCIETY

Membership

During 1995, we learnt with regret of the deaths of W. Bailey, Teresa, Lady Briscoe OBE, B. J. Burr, J. W. D. Cawthorne, Max Davies (Hon Sec. 1979–84), Miss E. G. Dobinson, Miss D. Eyre, J. J. H. Griffiths, A. C. Hills, Mrs P. Murphy, Mrs F. Shand Kydd, C. Le Messurier, J. V. Palmer and Miss M. Whiting. At the end of 1995, we totalled 548 members – 309 ordinary, 101 family counted as two, two junior, 19 honorary and life, four exofficio, and 12 affiliated societies.

The report and accounts for 1994 and the 1995 AGM agenda were included in the Spring Newsletter 1955. The 1995 AGM was held in the County Museum for the first time since 1977, in the new Art Gallery, and was followed by a buffet. The AGM minutes were reproduced in the Autumn Newsletter 1955.

Local Government Commission

The Government decided to split off Milton Keynes Borough as a Unitary Authority; the remainder of Buckinghamshire to retain its County Council and the existing four District Councils. The County and Milton Keynes Councils are now in the process of sorting out the consequences of this decision, due to come into full force in April 1977. It is to be hoped that provisions for non-statutory services, such as the County Record Office, County Museum and County Archaeology Unit, don't fall down the potential crack.

Library & Museum Sub-Committee

Society representatives were the President (Elliott Viney Esq FSA), Dr A H J Baines FSA and Dr R P Hagerty, all three being members of the Museum Panel. Representative on the new Countywide Consultative Committee for Museums and the Countywide Advisory Committee for Archaeology was Dr Hagerty.

On 25 October 1995, Society Trustees completed a 120-year lease to the County County of County Museum Society-owned buildings and Collection, to replace the current 42-year lease expiring in 1999.

County Museum

High point of the year was the re-opening of the Museum by the Lord Lieutenant, Lord Cottesloe, on 25 october, after six year's closure of the main buildings for refurbishment. Regrettably, the Society which originally founded the Museum received scant mention or publicity from the reopening.

First event in the the New Art Gallery was an exhibition on the theme of The Three Magi as suggested by Sir Timothy Raison who initiated and drove the Art Gallery Appeal.
