ADVERTISEMENT.

The following sheets were originally issued with the annual parts of Records of Buckinghamshire for the years 1885—1890.

As now collected into a volume, it is believed that they contain notices of all the printed books, pamphlets, and separate publications which have hitherto appeared, specifically relating to the county and the parishes therein, with very few exceptions.

Whilst the Biographies of several persons whose memory has not reached much beyond the bounds of their own locality are mentioned in these pages, it may perhaps be wondered why the Lives of some more celebrated men are not similarly noticed. The numerous Biographies of the poet Cowper, for example, have relation to the parishes of Olney and Weston-under-Wood. This, however, is so widely known that to have included them would have served no useful purpose.

A large collection might still be made of articles from journals and other books descriptive of the county and localities within its bounds; and the MSS, preserved in public libraries and private depositories would furnish material for another catalogue of no less interest and usefulness.

It has been mentioned in another place (RECORDS OF BUCKS, Vol. V., p. 372) that a full catalogue of the Corporation Seals of Buckinghamshire is a desideratum. As regards Trade Tokens, though additional examples are occasionally found, it is hoped that the new edition of Boyne's work upon the subject, edited by Mr. George C. Williamson, (the first volume of which has recently been published,) will be found fairly complete.

This edition, in which the plates and letter-press descriptions are printed on one side only of the leaves, includes the contents of the two works, *The Antiquarian Cabinet* and *Ancient Reliques*, before mentioned. The plates (upwards of 600 in number) were engraved by James Storer and John Greig.

There are large-paper copies in 8°. In the preface it is said that this work (which contains more than 150 plates, engraved by J. and H. S. Storer) may be considered a second series of The Antiquarian Cabinet. A considerable number of the views in The Antiquarian Cabinet and The Portfolio relate to Buckinghamshire.
